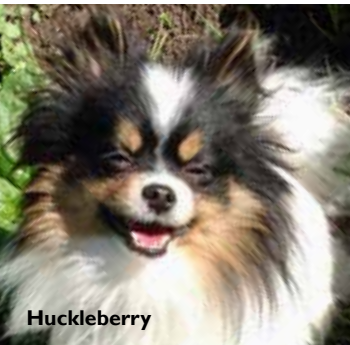

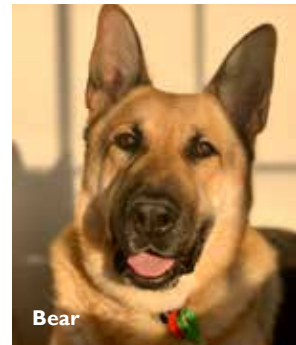

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## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Looking back over the past 12 months of life at the Dogs' Homes of Tasmania brings to mind the optimism with which we began the year, looking forward to celebrating our 70<sup>th</sup> Birthday in late 2020! What a year it has been!

Our CEO, Michael Sertori, has reported on the operational successes and challenges we faced during the year, and continue to face. I would like to add my heartfelt thanks to all who have assisted us in caring for our dogs during these difficult times, and to reflect on the ways in which this has been accomplished.

When I adopted my first Dogs' Home dog in 1994 after relocating from Sydney, I was introduced to a wonderful team of people who demonstrated a kindness and respect for the dogs in their care without equal. The faces have changed over time, but the same level of caring persists and has been ever stronger during the trying times in which we have found ourselves during the past few months.

The changes to the way in which we operate, necessitated by Covid 19, have not only kept our people safe, but have enhanced the experience of our dogs. In response to the Covid 19 restrictions, and to safeguard our dogs and our people, all of our Homes have been closed to the general public and a booking system has been in place for adoptions and surrenders and those reclaiming lost dogs. In addition, a call out for additional Foster Carers attracted a magnificent response, which has reduced the number of dogs at the Homes at any one time, with those who remained with us awaiting their new home remaining noticeably calmer. I know their new families will benefit from their companionship!

Our ability to remain in business, unlike so many others, could only have been achieved with the support of our many wonderful donors and volunteers who provide not only financial support but the enrichment, stimulation and exercise our dogs need to remain healthy and happy whilst they wait for their permanent home. Special applause in this regard must go to the invaluable fundraising activities of the Auxiliary, and to the assistance provided by in particular Purina and JB Hi Fi through our affiliation with the Animal Welfare League Australia.

A review of the past twelve months would not be complete without an acknowledgment of the significant contributions of each and every one of our indefatigable staff, Michael's exemplary leadership, and the Board's

generous sharing of their skills and expertise for the benefit of our dogs and the organisation as a whole.

I am so proud of all of our people and extend my thanks and gratitude for all they do.

It is uncertain when this liminal time – the space between no longer and not yet - in which we find ourselves will come to an end, but I am confident that our past achievements and the strong sense of community engendered by them will augur well for the next seventy years!

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## TREASURER'S REPORT

The 2019-2020 financial year overall surplus for the year was \$659,873. A substantial factor in this positive result was the generosity of supporters remembering the TCDL through bequests.

The operating result before bequests are taken into account, showed a deficit of \$436, 995. In part this deficit was a continuation of the trend of previous years, but it was also partly a result of a decision by the Board in July 2019 to invest in a program of improvements and repairs, funded from our reserves. While not ideal, the underlying operating deficit is manageable, and with the continued support of our community and a focus by staff and management on cost containment and prudent management, the long term viability of the TCDL is sound.

Works completed as part of our investment program included new exercise yards, play equipment, improved assessment facilities and maintenance on kennels. These works have directly supported our core mission, improving the quality of the dog accommodation enhance the physical and mental health of the dogs in our care. Other investments such as IT improvements have made us more efficient, reducing the time required for routine administrative tasks and enabling us to implement systems - such as online Expressions of Interest for special needs dogs - that deliver better outcomes for our dogs.

Our operating result in 2019-2020 was substantially impacted during the last quarter by the Covid 19 pandemic. Lockdown restrictions in the community saw a significant reduction in the number of dogs available for adoption, with a flow on impact on our adoption fees. Income from boarding, reclaim fees and surrender fees was also substantially reduced. Covid 19 requirements also brought an increase in operating costs with additional work hours needed for extra cleaning of public areas and managing visitor access, and an electronic booking system implemented to allow adoptions, surrenders and reclaims to continue in line with contact tracing requirements. Government support initiatives including Jobkeeper offset some of these additional costs.

The impact of the pandemic will continue into 2020-21 and income from adoptions, boarding and reclaims will remain depressed with no certainty on how long this trend may continue. With government funding subsidies winding down during the coming months, the situation will be monitored closely. Planned expenditure on further improvements has been placed on hold and tight expenditure controls are in place. We are operating in an unprecedented economic climate, however with strong reserves and with the continued support of our friends, the TCDL will continue to adapt so that we remain a strong and viable organisation.

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# CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

## *'difficult roads led to beautiful destinations'*

The year in review is one we could never expect. The year began with excited anticipation of celebrating our 70<sup>th</sup> year and rolling out our state-wide Critical Infrastructure Works Program. It ended with us operating under a COVID Safety Plan consequent to the out break of the global COVID 19 Pandemic.

On reflection, I am immensely proud of our achievements and particularly our response during the State of Emergency. Despite the many restrictions but with the amazing work of staff and volunteers and support of the public, we were able to quickly adapt our business and continue to see the joy of many dogs adopted by new families.

In the previous financial year, we welcomed the generosity of the Tasmanian Government awarding a grant of \$150,000 to help fund the Hobart Dogs' Home component of our Critical Infrastructure Works Program. The grant is now expended and the work completed funding a security system upgrade, perimeter fence screening, major drainage works and installing an accessible path entry to the Home.

In addition, around \$350,000 has been spent on critical improvements across all four Homes. I am delighted to record my appreciation of the generous contribution of our wonderful Auxiliary, the Waratah Wynyard Council (Burnie Home), TG & JM Matthews Foundation (Devonport Home), and Anne Shelverton Estate. The balance of the cost of the program was funded from reserves the product of bequests and fundraising and consequently I thank all of our wonderful supporters who share our passion for caring for dogs across Tasmania

The Burnie and Devonport Dogs' Homes have new dog exercise yards and equipment to improve the quality of our support of the dogs, and extensive maintenance work has been completed to improve facilities. Our newest facility the Launceston Dogs' Home received new equipment to improve our care of the dogs and at the Hobart Dogs' Home improvements have been made to the Council drop off area to the pound, new pound exercise yard installed, new dog play equipment installed and a new facility constructed for our dog assessment program. Some of this work is still in progress for completion over the next few months.

Our aging IT System has been upgraded and improvements made to our Point of Sale system offering greater efficiency for staff across the state. We now have a new website offering significantly improved functionality and presentation and I am delighted it has been well received by the public.

Additional vet nursing and new supervisor supports have been installed to assist with presenting workloads and coordination of our Foster Care, Volunteer and Community Engagement Programs at the Burnie, Devonport and Launceston Dogs' Homes. Staff have also benefited from our expanded training resources focused on dog assessment and management.





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With minor upgrades to our Burnie Caretakers Cottage and significant renovation of our Devonport Cottage we now have tenants in the Burnie, Devonport and Hobart Caretakers Cottages offering welcome income and a watchful eye.

November launched our 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year with a Reception at Government House hosted by Her Excellency Kate Warner and Mr Warner. The function was well supported and we were delighted Her Excellency welcomed two of our adopted Dogs' Homes Dogs, Nell and Norm. As we announced a calendar of events to celebrate 70 years of caring for dogs we could not anticipate 2020 would become the year it has.

The year began inspired by the result of our Christmas appeal followed by a record response to our Button Day Appeal. Next the COVID – 19 Pandemic presented affecting all of us. We had to quickly respond to the declared State of Emergency to be able to continue to operate as an Essential Service.

Fundraising events were cancelled and the 70<sup>th</sup> year celebrations deferred.

The gates closed at each of the Dogs' Homes and an online booking system installed to manage visits to each home. We were overwhelmed by massive response to our invitation for new Foster Carers and very quickly a large number of dogs were moved into foster care.

New systems were installed to manage strict cleaning regimes, ensure social distancing and personal hygiene practices and many other actions taken to comply with the State of Emergency requirements.

I am so proud of the way staff and volunteers have come together to do whatever it takes to ensure each Dogs' Home continues to operate and support the dogs in our care. My heartfelt thanks is offered to all our staff and volunteers. I am in awe of each and every employee who freely embraced a workplace of rapid change and the challenge of learning to use new programs and cope with new systems. I deeply appreciate the understanding and support of our volunteers when suddenly a casual trip to the Dogs' Home was not possible.

It was once said **'difficult roads led to beautiful destinations'** and that has certainly been our experience through the pandemic. Despite the many challenges and the rapid nature of presenting change, we experienced the joy of record adoption numbers and for the first time in our long history, we experienced some days where the adoption kennels were empty.

The support and encouragement of the public has been a great source of inspiration to us. I particularly appreciate the public understanding of the newly introduced restrictions at each Home.

In lieu of our usual mid-year appeal, a special *dogtales* letter issued, providing an update on our operations during the State of Emergency and sending our best wishes to all of our loyal supporters. We were taken by surprise with the response. Over \$25,000 in donations were made with



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many letters of support and encouragement received. It is very humbling to be loved and respected and it has inspired to deal with the presenting challenges. To all our caring supporters I record my heartfelt thanks and appreciation.

I particularly appreciate our affiliation with the Animal Welfare League of Australia (AWLA) whose sponsor partnerships are a significant source of regular income from workplace giving programs and donation of dog food and supplies. In particular I acknowledge with appreciation the significant contributions of both Purina and JB Hi Fi. I thank the Directors and staff of AWLA not only for their hard work and dedication but also for their support and encouragement over the recent challenging period.

We provide Pound Services for 10 Councils across Tasmania and have formal Agreements with the remaining Councils to receive dogs for rehoming. I thank each for their continued support and encouragement in our mutually valued association.

The cancelation of events has limited the activities of the Auxiliary despite which we continue to enjoy their wonderful generosity and support. To all members of the Auxiliary I record my heartfelt thanks your tireless work and welcome encouragement.

Our volunteers work very hard to help with the dogs in our care, fundraising activities and maintenance work. To each and every one I again offer my thanks and appreciation.

To all our Foster Carers, and welcome to the many new carers, I thank you for your dedication and commitment.

Volunteering to a Community Board can be very demanding and this is very much the case for the TCDL Board in recent months. With our limited resources, we rely on the regular contribution of each Board members skill and expertise. I greatly value their contribution and support and thank each for their dedication and commitment.

I am delighted to record my congratulations to every one of our employees for their hard work, dedication, passion and commitment. On a regular basis I witness their amazing caring work, making the near impossible, possible for many dogs to find their forever home.

It is difficult to forecast the years ahead. Like many we are presented with challenges we would not have expected to face. We do need to expand our income base and more than ever will depend on the generous contribution of our supporters and volunteers.

# Notes to the Financial Statements

## Tasmanian Canine Defence League Inc

For the year ended 30 June 2020

### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared for the Members of the League to enable compliance with requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (TAS). The League is of a type identified in Statement of Accounting Concepts 1 as a non-reporting entity, therefore generally accepted accounting principles have been used in the preparation of these accounts.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

#### Income Tax Exemption

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Tasmanian Canine Defence League Inc is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Land improvements were made at Risdon Vale for \$87,841 during the year, including drainage and related works. Being a Land category of Asset, these improvements have been deemed non-depreciable.

#### Account Receivables and Other Receivables

Trade Receivables are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

#### Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the entity's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

These notes should be read in conjunction with the attached compilation report.

### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

### **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

### **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included in the Balance Sheet.

### **Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the entity during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

## **2. Minor Capital Expenditure**

Capital items costing less than \$1,000 are expensed in the year they are purchased.

## **3. Cash on Hand**

This includes \$290,000 bank cheque held by the bank for lodgement of a term deposit not yet set up by the bank at the time of the audit.

## Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Tasmanian Canine Defence League Inc (the Entity), which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2020, the Profit and Loss Statement, Statement of Changes in Equity and Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the declaration by those charged with governance.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at 30 June 2020 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

## Basis for Qualified Opinion

The cash donations are a significant source of revenue for Tasmanian Canine Defence League Inc. The Tasmanian Canine Defence League Inc has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of cash donations prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding revenue from this source was limited, our audit procedures with respect to cash donations had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion on whether the recorded cash donations of Tasmanian Canine Defence League Inc are complete.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standard Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

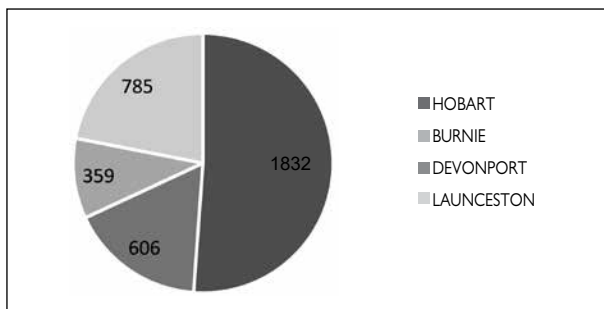

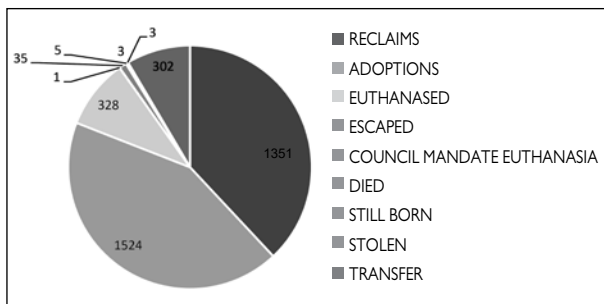

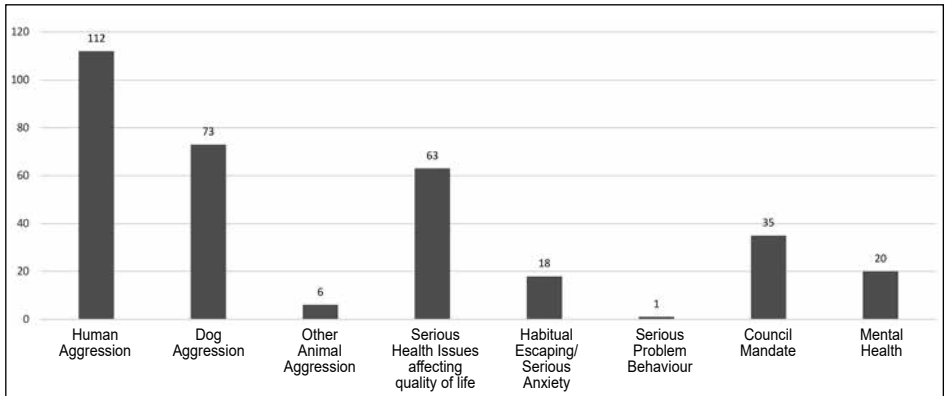
